Unlike 2020 when the club was locked out of the greenhouse area due to COVID-19, the summer of 2021 began with the Harvest Crew working overtime collecting plants from residents' yards. This led to a need for more people to pot up the cacti and agaves, and then to keep them watered. May ended with a series of 100+ degree days as a prelude to June's heat! As fall came along, the greenhouse needed to be emptied and the plant inventory reduced to make room for construction of the new greenhouse in 2022.



Even though he was new to the club this year, it did not take the head of the potting crew, Sandy Warmuth, to put Jim Hussey to work rummaging through the pot supply for ones to accommodate several newly harvested plants.

To reduce inventory before the greenhouse is torn down to make way for the new greenhouse, plants sales are held for club members only. From 8 to 11 on Tuesdays and Thursdays, members took home hundreds of plants for as little as \$1 each.



The greenhouse crew created a beautiful dish garden that was given away though a free drawing. President Dave Wiegand and Vice President Linda Hunter answered many cactus questions and invited at least a hundred new residents to join the club.
