Mike Anderson was there early to pump out the water and begin removing some of the screws, at eight am, Jim Vanderpoel, Dave Wiegand, and Randy Rubattino joined Mike to remove the metal parts, throw away the old panels, clean out the mud, and generally scrape and scrub away the mess of minerals on the system.

Additionally, a week before this, Mike and the Rec Center employees installed an electronic device on the water pipe that we hope will remove the minerals from the water and make the wall more effective.
